His career has spanned numerous postings in the Hungarian government. Ambassador Gyarmati is currently Chairman of the Budapest Centre for Euro-Atlantic Integration and Democracy, Senior Political Adviser of the Director of the Geneva Centre for the Democratic Control of Armed Forces (DCAF), and of many other international and national institutions and organisations. Between 2008 and 2009, he was the head of the Defense Minister's Task Force, created to draft the National Military Strategy of the Republic of Hungary. Ambassador Gyarmati holds a Ph.D. in Political Science with a focus on Strategic Studies. He is a member of the IISS, the European Council for Foreign Relations, the European Advisory Group, the NATO Defense College and numerous scientific projects.

Panyi Szabolcs

Szabolcs Panyi is an investigative reporter for Direkt36, where he covers national security and defense. He received a Fulbright scholarship to the United States and his work was shortlisted for the 2018 and 2021 European Press Prize. Panyi's reporting has shed light on Russia's political, economic and defense interests in Hungary, as well as the evolving relationship between PM Viktor Orbán and former US President Donald Trump. In 2019, Panyi uncovered several investigations into the relocation of the formerly-Soviet International Investment Bank (IIB), a shadowy Russian-led bank to Budapest. Forbidden Stories and Amnesty International were able to confirm through a forensic analysis that Panyi's was infected with Pegasus spying software in 2019. Panyi's targeting continued through the end of 2019. During this time, Panyi worked on a follow up story about two Russian arms dealers who were arrested in Budapest as part of a US DEA sting operation.
